Chapter 3

Preliminary data analysis

In this chapter we describe the preliminary analysis of the responses obtained from the students in our study. These subjects comprised 1,440 students attending the Pattani primary school. A description of the variables and the bullying experiences in University school are shown, and the characteristics of bullies are presented.

3.1 Description of the variables

There are 8 explanatory variables, three (grade, weight group, and height group) are ordinal, and five (career ambitions, method of travelling to school, willing at school, favourite zone, and unsafe zone) are nominal. Table 3.1 shows the frequency distributions of the explanatory variables. The student participants were equally distributed across urban and rural school locations. Of all participating students, 72.2% were from public schools and 55.4% were female. Slightly more than one third (34.5%) were 8 years or less of age, 34.0% were aged 9-10 years, and 31.5% were 11 years old or more.

Most of the students were Muslim (54.0%) and 20.3% of students reported that they had witnessed physical abuse between their parents. Nearly half (48.2%) of the students preferred 'mystery' cartoons. Regarding number of close friends, 41.4% had 3-5 close friends, 32.2% had two close friends or fewer and 26.4% had six close friends or more.

Table 3.2 shows the frequency distributions of the characteristics of students. The majority of the students (38.5%) were weight 25-35 kilogram and 42.4% were 126-140 centimeter of height. With respect to career ambitions, 30.8% of the students wanted to be teachers, while 26.5% wanted to be physicians or nurses, and 21.1% wanted to be in the militaries or police forces'. Most (64.0%) traveled to school with their parents and 56.3% felt enjoyed and 40.6% felt happy when must go to school.

Most students (63.7%) were most favorite library or computer, and regarding most feel unsafe school zone, 31.5% were back building, 29.4% were classroom, and 23.0% were toilet.

Table 3.3 shows the frequency distributions of physical bullying behaviour. Of the 1,440 students who took part in the study, most students (34.9%) reported having ever throwing something at anyone, 24.9% had ever kicked anyone, 23.8% had ever hit anyone, 20.9% had ever pushed anyone, 14.3% had ever beat anyone, 13.1% had ever pinched anyone, and 12.2% had ever bitten anyone.

Table 3.4 shows the frequency distributions of psychological bullying behaviour. The results show that nearly haft of the students (47.2%) reported having ever scolded/ name called anyone, 29.0% had ever insulted another students parents' name, 25.9% had ever insulted another students parents' occupations, 11.3% had ever insulted another students academic achievement, 9.6% had ever insulted another students appearance, 6.4% had ever insulted another students by stating a physical disability, and 5.5% had ever insulted another students economic status.

3.3 Characteristics of bullies

Table 3.5 shows a cross-tabulation between physical bullying and psychological bullying. Of the 1,440 students in the study, 1,036 students (71.9%) reported having bullied others in any form.

Table 3.6 shows the frequency distributions of the characteristics of bullies. Of the 1,036 students who reported having bullied others, the majority of bullies (67.8%) reported that they had bullied others while alone. More than one third of the bullies (39.5%) bullied both male and female, and 33.0% bullied male.

Most of the bullies (81.5%) bullied others of the same age, 71.5% bullied others in the classroom, and 36.4% bullied others at lunch break. The reason of bullying others, approximately 27.2% of the bullies reported that they had bullying others because for enjoyed, to show off (23.8%), and for revenge (19.1%).
